

Libra Collections Policy October 2014

Libra allows University of Virginia scholars to make completed versions of their work—such as preprints and published articles—freely available to the general public for non-commercial research, scholarship, teaching and learning, and to store their work in a central, stable location. The repository makes research more visible to a wider audience and helps assure the long-term preservation of U.Va. scholars' works.

While Libra has been developed specifically as a repository for peer-reviewed, scholarly articles authored by the U.Va. community, other works such as books may be deposited as well, as long as sufficient rights have been retained by the author or authors. U.Va. scholars may also deposit data sets if the data is suitable for open access.

Dissertations and theses of graduating U.Va. students from participating schools and departments are added to Libra and made available on a long-term basis as a replacements for paper copies added to the Library's shelves. Dissertations and theses in PDF or other department-approved formats may be deposited in Libra within technical limitations of the current Libra platform.

Items generated by the U.Va. community accepted for deposit in Libra:

- Electronic theses and dissertations (including PDF and other department-approved formats such as HTML and multimedia)
- Scholarly articles (peer-reviewed preferred)
- Conference papers and posters
- Technical reports
- Datasets, or other products of research, suitable for open access (e.g. sets of images, records, quantitative, and qualitative data)
- Grey literature (e.g., blog posts, Twitter logs, non-published talks and presentations)
- In addition to the above items, a forthcoming functionality in Libra will accept links to re3data.org -reviewed research data repositories with U.Va. data deposits (e.g., ICPSR, figshare)*

* Metadata and links to persistent identifiers (e.g., DOI) for data stored in re3data.org-reviewed repositories which meet the following criteria may be included in a forthcoming Libra release: Open Access, persistent identifier, and re3data.org-reviewed. See <http://www.re3data.org/faq/> for criteria descriptions.

At this time, there is no comparable standard for preservation criteria for discipline-based and institutional repositories. The Libra Services Team will continue to monitor national and international standards until such time as widely-recognized and broadly-applicable evaluation criteria are available for discipline-based and institutional repositories.
